The main role of a Parish Councillor is to represent the views of residents within our parish. As a member of the Parish Council you will share responsibility for decisions about local services which may include: Open Spaces, Play Areas the Community Hall, and other issues affecting the parish. You will be part of the decision making when the Parish Council considers whether the Parish Precept should be raised. This is our local contribution to part of the Council Tax and is used to help deliver the Parish Council's services. You can assist in bringing forward ideas for future projects for the council and as part of the planning process, comment on planning applications in the parish as well as playing a part of improving the quality of life and the environment in our local area. You could be working to identify issues which are important to the lives of the residents you represent, lobbying other service providers and working in partnership with other parishes and agencies.

Why not attend one of our monthly council meetings to gain an insight into the workings of the council? You will be surprised what the council duties are and what is discussed. If you are interested after that, you can always contact the Parish Clerk or a Councillor directly, to gain a further insight to the workings of the Parish council, we would love to see you. Parish Council meetings are normally held in the Pinewood Community Hall on the second Monday of the month, starting at 19.30hrs, dates are featured on page 7 of this newsletter. To stand for election or co-option on a parish council, you must:

be a UK or Commonwealth citizen; or be a citizen of the Republic of Ireland; be a citizen of another Member state of the European Union; be at least 18 years old.

To be eligible to stand for an election for a particular parish, you must:

be an elector of the parish;

in the past 12 months have occupied (as owner or tenant) land or other premises in the parish; work in the parish (as your principal or only place of work);

live within three miles of the parish boundary.

Wolsey Grange, Ipswich Future Highways Works

You may be aware that Taylor Wimpey began improvements to the local highway network for the much-needed new development at Wolsey Grange.

The site will deliver more than 300 new homes and related open space and recreation facilities, and an area for future employment has also been identified.

The road work programme was due to commence at the beginning of September and run through to mid December. However, changes to the design have been identified which will deliver improvements beyond that of those originally identified. As such, the works have been rescheduled to commence at the beginning of April 2020.

These works will increase capacity and safety measures. The provisions include new signalling, new footpaths and cycle ways, junction improvements and resurfacing.

Taylor Wimpey has planned to minimise disruption during this time as much as possible.

As plans progress, we remain committed to update you on the progress of these works.

Next steps


The following improvements will be carried out in Spring 2020. These timescales are subject to detailed programmes:

A1071/Poplar Lane junction: Over 14 weeks, an extra lane will be built leading up to the A1214 as well as an extra cycle lane. There will also be new signals at the A1071 and Poplar Lane junction which will also be resurfaced. The section of the A1071 between the A1214 and Poplar Lane will be closed during this time, with traffic diverted through London Road and Hadleigh Road, to speed up the works.

A1214/A1071 junction: This will start alongside the A1071/Poplar Lane junction works, and will take up to four weeks. The works will see improvements made to traffic islands at the junction with Scrivener Drive to allow two lanes from the A1071, along with resurfacing and signalling. A1214 traffic will be reduced to a single lane in each direction to ensure the work can be safely carried out.

Belstead House and Belstead Meadows Planning Update

A12/A14 Meeting at Capel St Mary.

This was convened on 11th October by James Cartlidge MP for residents in Pinewood and the villages which border these two major roads. On the panel was a representative from Suffolk Highways, Mary Evans, Cabinet Member for Highways, Transport and Rural Affairs, Simon Amor, Head of Planning and Development Operations for the Eastern Region, Highways England, John Ward, Leader of Babergh District Council and a Chief Inspector from Suffolk Police. The meeting was very well attended with many residents from the neighbouring villages. It was organised as a question and answer session.

The Copdock Mill Interchange junction was discussed. It is hoped that RIS (Road Investment Strategy) funding will be available from next April and that improvements to Copdock should be the first to be announced, before the end of the year. The Suffolk County Council priority is from Seven Hills to Copdock.

It was agreed that the A12 needs major investment. The unsuitability of the Capel, Higham and East Bergholt junctions were of particular concern because of the short length of the slip roads at these locations. The volume of traffic now makes them dangerous for road users trying to access the A12.

It was accepted that closures of the Orwell Bridge cause great disruption to the whole of the Ipswich Fringe area. I was able to comment on the effect that it has on Pinewood and beyond. A study by UCL on ways to mitigate the effects of these closures is expected in the coming months. Changing the wind speed limit is being considered as is the possibility of ways of keeping it open for some traffic.

A Belstead Councillor raised the issue of the noise created by the concrete surface of the A 14 which passes by that village. Simon Amor said it did not come within the designated range for noise reduction. It was agreed that a further meeting to discuss this problem would be arranged. After the meeting I pointed out to Simon that I had been present at the original meeting 2 yeas ago at Belstead and that the noise was not just an issue for the residents of Belstead Village but also for many of the residents of the more than 2,000 homes in Pinewood. Hopefully this could make the case for noise reduction more viable. He said Pinewood could be included in any future discussions. I have since contacted him to confirm this and he has done so.

A resident of Pinewood spoke about the Belstead development and the lack of a traffic Survey. Mary Evans said she would speak to him at the end of the meeting. I also spoke to her and said that we had asked in our submissions on this development for new traffic surveys to be done during term time and not during school holidays. She said she would look into the matter but we have not heard from her yet.

Excess speed on local roads was mentioned as an increasing problem. This includes motor bikes racing on the A137! The effect of the loss of local bus services on the more rural communities has had a detrimental effect on these communities, resulting in a feeling of isolation.

Many residents and communities are very concerned about the great amount of housing that is proposed for this area and John Ward was questioned very critically about this. He said that decisions had been taken to have major housing developments close to major road networks, hence the concentration in this area of Babergh. He was left in no doubt that our road network is already suffering from a high level of congestion without the extra burden that more housing will bring. Though people understand that more homes are needed this area in Babergh seems to have more new building than many other areas affected by decisions made the Planning Department and Planning Committee of the District Council.

This meeting was certainly a worthwhile exercise to gauge local opinion on road and traffic issues that effect communities large and small in this area of Babergh. In fact it seems that whatever the size of the community many of these problems are common to us all.

There remains a focus on speeding in all areas of Pinewood. Vehicles speeding nationally has risen hence a crack down on this behaviour is at the forefront of Police operations.



Student briefings, as mentioned in the previous newsletter were carried were due to be carried out in November by Suffolk Police. These briefings were to target Parking and other aspects of anti social behaviour such as littering etc.

Parking Initiatives are being taken seriously and there remains much work to be carried out by associated agencies concerned, to bring these issues to a sensible conclusion.

There are still many resident concerns voiced in the most affected areas and of late many issues have been raised by residents to the Parish Council, these have been further forwarded to the agencies involved in bringing this parking issue to a suitable and meaningful conclusion.

Representatives meeting and working on the parking issues are from Pinewood Parish Council, Suffolk County Council, Babergh District Council, Suffolk One along with Suffolk Police.

Teaching Staff from Suffolk One are also being proactive and responsive in walking the areas to monitor inappropriate parking and, as witnessed by some residents, have spoken to Students when they returned to pick their vehicles up at the end of the day to point out areas of concern.

Fly Tipping in Pinewood

Recently there have been instances of Fly Tipping occurring in Pinewood. If you discover fly-tipped waste:

<u>Don't touch the waste</u> - it may contain syringes, toxic chemicals or other hazardous substances. <u>Don't disturb the site</u> - there may be evidence that could help identify the fly-tippers and lead to their prosecution.

Do visually try to work out what the waste consists of and how much there is - take photos if it is safe to do so. Make a note of the day, date and time you saw the tipping, its exact location and whether it's in or near water. Keep any notes you make, even scribbled ones, as they can be very valuable as evidence. Contact us at Babergh District Council as soon as possible so that we can investigate.

If you witness someone fly-tipping, make a note of

how many people are involved and what they look like, what has been dumped - how much and what it looks like also details of any vehicles involved including make, colour and registration number if possible and call 999 if the incident is still in progress.

Be very careful. Remember that fly-tippers are doing something illegal – they are unlikely to welcome people observing them or taking notes or photographs.

As well as being an eyesore and a nuisance, on most public land it is an offence under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 not to clear up after your dog after it has fouled. The District Council has powers to issue 'on the spot'



Fixed Penalty Notices of £50, or to prosecute in the criminal courts, which could lead to a fine of up to £1.000.

Dog fouling should be wrapped and disposed of in one of the many dog or litter bins in the district, or by placing it in your black wheelie bin.
