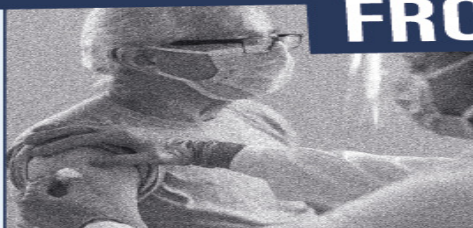

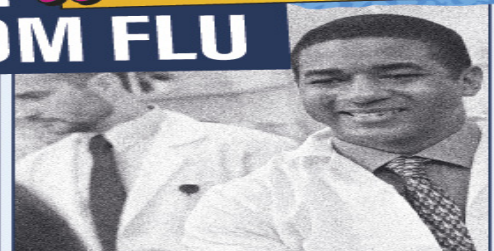

TIER TWO RULES

Help stop the spread of COVID-19 



Households are **not** allowed to mix with other people indoors, unless with people in your support bubble.

You can meet with up to **5 other people**, maximum of 6 including yourself, **outside** as long as everyone stays 2 metres apart.



Schools, universities and colleges remain **open**.

Everyone who **can** work from home should do so.

Children **can** move between homes if their parents are separated.



Pubs and bars must close, unless operating as restaurants. Alcohol can only be served with substantial meals. Venues must stop taking orders at 10pm, and close at 11pm.

Retail, indoor leisure, entertainment, personal care, and accommodation settings are **open**.



Whenever you are out of your home, remember '**Hands. Face. Space**':

Hands – wash your hands regularly and for 20 seconds

Face – wear a face covering over nose and mouth in indoor settings

Space – stay 2 metres apart from people you do not live with where possible.



Get tested if you have symptoms: a high temperature; a new continuous cough; a loss of, or change to, your sense of smell and taste.

If you or anyone you have been in close contact with has symptoms, follow the guidance on self-isolation.



Travel: You must follow tier 2 rules when you travel to a tier 1 area. Avoid travel to, or overnight stays, in tier 3 areas other than where necessary, e.g. work, education, medical treatment, or caring responsibilities.

You can travel through a tier 3 area as a part of a longer journey.

The Parish Council meetings are having to be carried out by Zoom at present in order for us to maintain our parish duties. You can join a meeting if you would like to and hear what goes on in your area. Hopefully sometime next year we can get back to open meetings at the hall, 2nd Monday in the month 7.30 pm, all welcome.

On that note we are still looking for a couple of additional councillors that we could co-opt (join). You may have found that working from home has given you some spare time, if you are interested, please come forward, view a meeting online or perhaps attend as soon as we are able to, after all, its your area.

Pinewood Community Hall

The Community Hall has had to be closed for much of 2020 due to the corona virus pandemic so it has been an unusual year.

It was closed in March as a result of the first national lockdown.

As the country began to emerge from the lockdown during July and August and after following government guidelines, the hall was made 'COVID' safe which allowed some of the regular hirers to return in September and October.

The member's bar was able to open during October albeit with reduced numbers and after a wide variety of measures had to be implemented to comply with ever changing government requirements but it was nice to see the hall being used once again.

Unfortunately a second lockdown saw the hall closed again from 5th November until 1st December.

With Suffolk placed in Tier 2 from 2nd December the committee was faced with a decision whether to reopen the hall to its hirers. It has not been possible to open the members bar as it doesn't serve food, it is a community facility that supports a wide range of local activities and by the very nature of how it operates many people access the building daily which makes it vulnerable to the spread of the corona virus.

Whilst every precaution has already been taken to limit the spread of any infection brought into the hall, the rapidly rising cases of corona virus in Ipswich and particularly in the area around the community hall meant the committee took the decision not to reopen the hall until after the New Year in the hope that the number of cases will have significantly reduced making it safer for both its hirers, visitors and staff.

Hopefully Suffolk will return to Tier 1 by January 2021 and the hall will then be able to open again. In the meantime the Pinewood Community Hall, its committee and staff wish you a very Happy Christmas and look forward to things improving during 2021.

If your road has restrictions on parking, it should be monitored by members of the Parking Enforcement Team. District and Borough Councils will be empowered to make local decisions to suit local circumstances, Ipswich Borough Council is responsible for on-street parking enforcement within the borough of Ipswich and in parts of Babergh and Mid Suffolk, however dangerous parking, such as parking on bends and on corners is still dealt with by Suffolk Police.

Closure of footpath from Wilson/Wilding Road to Bridge School

Many of you will be aware of the problems residents have experienced because of the 6 month closure of Footpath 6 which runs from Sprites Lane to Wilson/Wilding Road, passing the back gate to the Bridge School. The closure has been deemed necessary because of building works at the school.

Pinewood Council has been in correspondence with Suffolk County Council since 29th August but have not had a positive response to our concerns. We have written to Concertus, Design and Property Consultants for SCC who are managing the project, the Public Rights of Way team and the CEO of Suffolk County Council. She passed our letter to Mark Ash, Director for Growth Highways and Infrastructure. We have been disappointed with the responses we have received as they have been ambiguous and contradictory.

We have asked for clarification but so far none has been received.

On October 6th the Ipswich Star published an article on the footpath situation and a spokesperson from SCC is quoted as saying that the council was working with the community to minimise disruption. We have seen no evidence of this.

On 19th November we wrote expressing our concerns about a proposed addition of a stone surface to the path so that it could be used as access to a car park. This will mean increased traffic use of the footpath. We have not received a response

to this letter and the proposed access to the carpark will begin very shortly. Greater traffic use gives an even greater impression that there is accepted vehicular access along the footpath and there is concern that it could set a worrying precedent for the future. Pinewood Parish Council will continue to try to get answers from Suffolk County Council.

Belstead House and Belstead Meadows planning application.

The Planning Committee of Babergh District Council met on 4th November to consider the reserved matters application for the above developments. It was held on Microsoft Teams and I was able to speak on behalf of the council.

I raised our continuing concerns as to the lack of clarity regarding the access to the Belstead Meadows site as we had received contradictory statements regarding the use of Sprites Lane and Cottingham Road.

I also queried the apparent change from the original planning statement. The original planning statement said that the dwellings would be predominantly for the over 55s but reserved matters documentation stated that 75 units would be for the open and affordable markets and 55 for the 55plus demographic.

Cllr. D. Busby who was previously our District Councillor, also spoke on our behalf and asked for a new traffic survey to be done as the previous one, completed some years ago, was done during the school holidays and before any of the new commercial outlets such as the Vets, Aldi and the pub were opened.

Our concerns were dismissed, we were told these matters were all considered at the outline planning stage. One of the committee members questioned the agent for the developers about the proposed care home and it seems that an operator for the home has yet to be engaged.

This planning application was then passed after a vote by the committee.

Please use the Dog Bins

As well as being an eyesore and a nuisance, on most public land it is an offence under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 not to clear up after your dog when it has fouled the area. Babergh District Council has powers to issue fines or prosecute which could lead to a £1000 fine. Wherever and whoever they may be please report the culprits with photos if possible.

Many complaints have been on local media regarding this issue, report it to get it stopped. There are sufficient dog bins placed around the parish for use by residents and visitors walking their dogs in the green areas.

Letting dogs mess on the ground and not cleaning up after them is unacceptable and irresponsible. These bins are emptied very regularly, sometimes on long bank holidays such as Xmas they change collection days. If the bin is full take the poo bag home with you and bin it, there is no need to throw it on the grass close to the overfilled bin.

Pinewood Community Hall Carpark

The pinewood community hall was built over ten years ago and has been very well used and supported. When the hall was built and to enable the hall to be built within budget, the car park was laid to stones, with thought to upgrading it a few years down the line if needed.

Since it was built it has struggled with drainage issues which when we have heavy rain, means it can flood a considerable amount of the parking spaces, which some days are at a premium.

The community hall has had a survey carried out and the works have gone out to tender. Hopefully through funding and grants we may be able to have the carpark drainage installed, a link to the main sewers and a new tarmac surface laid to bring the area more useable and easier access for people. We will also line all the Bays to enable maximum capacity

We have been saving hard to avoid putting any costs onto the precept as many people have suffered this year with a loss of earnings

As soon as we have any news to add on the project, we will bring you up to date through the news letter.

Advance Notice - Works on the A14 early 2021

We have been informed that Highways England will be carrying out repairs to the A14 from 4th January 2021 until the end of February 2021.

The section between Junctions 51 Beacon Hill and 54 Sproughton will be affected and contraflows will be in place between these junctions. It is anticipated that the roadworks will take place at night.

It will be necessary for there to be 10-night closures along this section. They will not be on consecutive nights. The diversion route will be through Washbrook, Sproughton and Bramford along the B113. The closures will be necessary to install, switch and remove the contraflow.

Fly Tipping in Pinewood

Recently there have been several further instances of Fly Tipping occurring in Pinewood which is becoming an issue to many residents who see this frequently on their travels.

If you discover fly-tipped waste please contact Babergh Dist Council ([see contact page](#))

Don't touch the waste - it may contain syringes, toxic chemicals or other hazardous substances.

Don't disturb the site - there may be evidence that could help identify the fly-tippers and lead to their prosecution.

Do visually try to work out what the waste consists of and how much there is - take photos if it is safe to do so. Make a note of the day, date and time you saw the tipping, its exact location and whether it's in or near water. Keep any notes you make, even scribbled ones, as they can be very valuable as evidence. Contact Babergh District Council as soon as possible so that we can investigate.

If you witness someone fly-tipping - make a note of how many people are involved and what they look like, what has been dumped - how much and what it looks like also details of any vehicles involved including make, colour and registration number if possible and call 999 if the incident is still in progress.

Be very careful Remember that fly-tippers are doing something illegal – they are unlikely to welcome people observing them or taking notes or photographs.

Please remember the following guidelines if you are dumping rubbish anywhere or paying for it to be disposed of.

You are legally responsible for any household waste produced on your property.

You could face an unlimited fine if your waste ends up being fly-tipped and you cannot show that you took reasonable steps to prevent it.

You must ensure it is only transferred to an authorised person or waste site that is appropriately registered with the relevant enforcement body.

If you are using a waste carrier (other than your Local Council) to remove household, garden or construction waste always ask for their waste carrier number. If in doubt check their details on the public register of waste collectors, or call the Environment Agency on 08708 506 506.

Always ask a carrier what exactly is going to happen to your waste and seek evidence that it is going to be disposed of appropriately. A legitimate, professional waste carrier who wants your business should not object to being asked reasonable questions.

Finally make sure you get a proper invoice and receipt for your waste and retain this as proof.

Speeding Complaints In Belmont Road & Shepherds Drive

Further to complaints received over several months along local roads our SNT Police team were asked by the Parish Council to carry out a speed survey along Belmont Road & Shepherds Drive. The prosecutable percentages along Belmont Road are high enough that it could become a green site, meaning there will be some form of enforcement by the Safety Camera Team, sadly, Shepherds Drive does not fill the criteria for enforcement action along its length. Speed Indicator Device

Many of you have seen the Speed Indicator Device that is positioned on a rotational system and sited upon roads around Pinewood that have been identified by residents as having vehicles speeding along them. Sadly, as you can see from the graphs on the next page, where featured, SID is identifying many vehicles travelling over the speed limit in these particular areas. The percentage of speeds recorded at these sites does not fill laid down criteria to carry out enforcement action on these roads. Speeding in Pinewood Parish remains of great concern to both the Police, Parish Council and many residents.

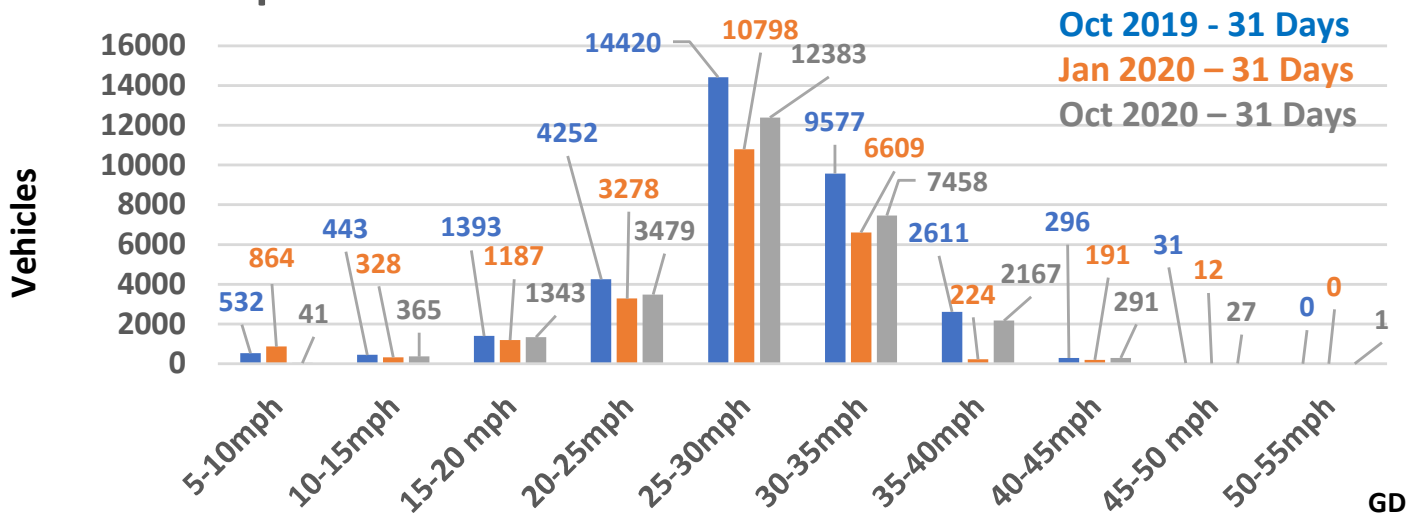

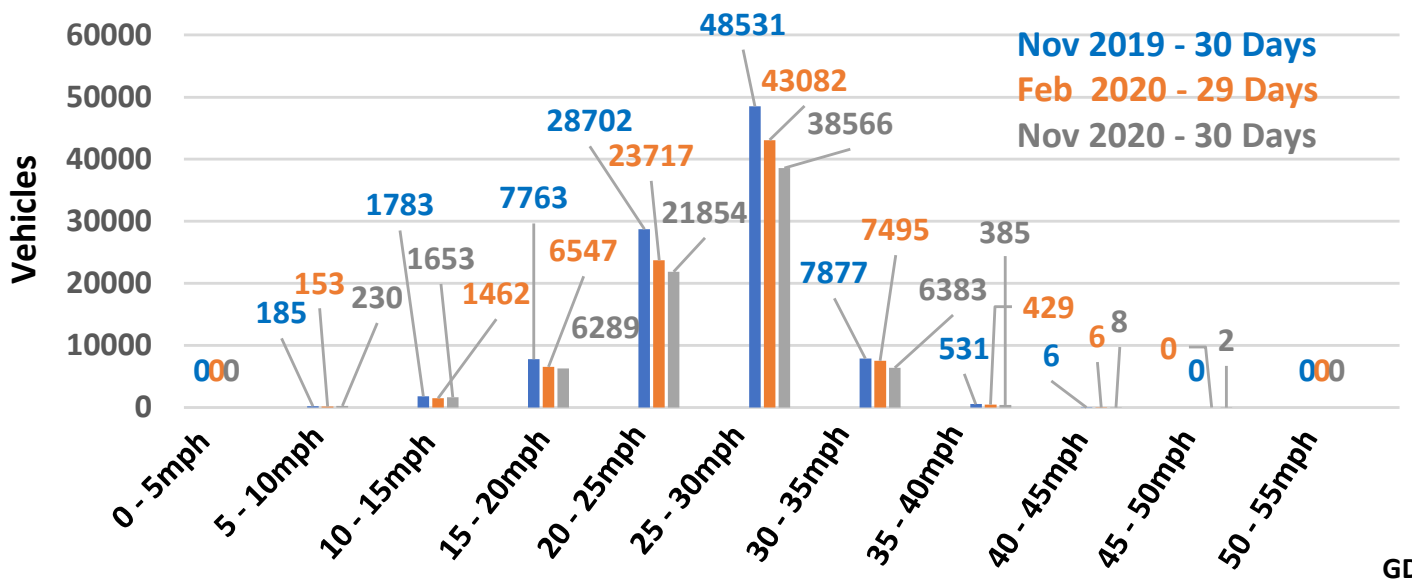
Speed Indicator Results - **SPEEDING KILLS – SLOW DOWN**

Vehicle speeds over 30mph in the identified in operational areas.

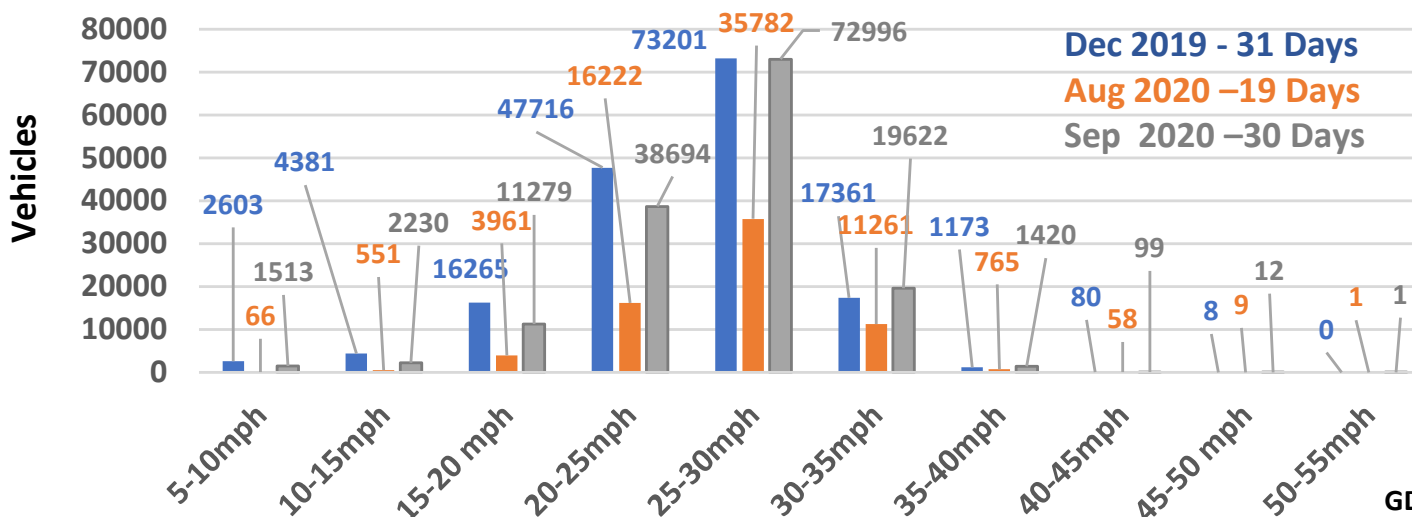
Speed Indicator Device Placed On Grove Hill

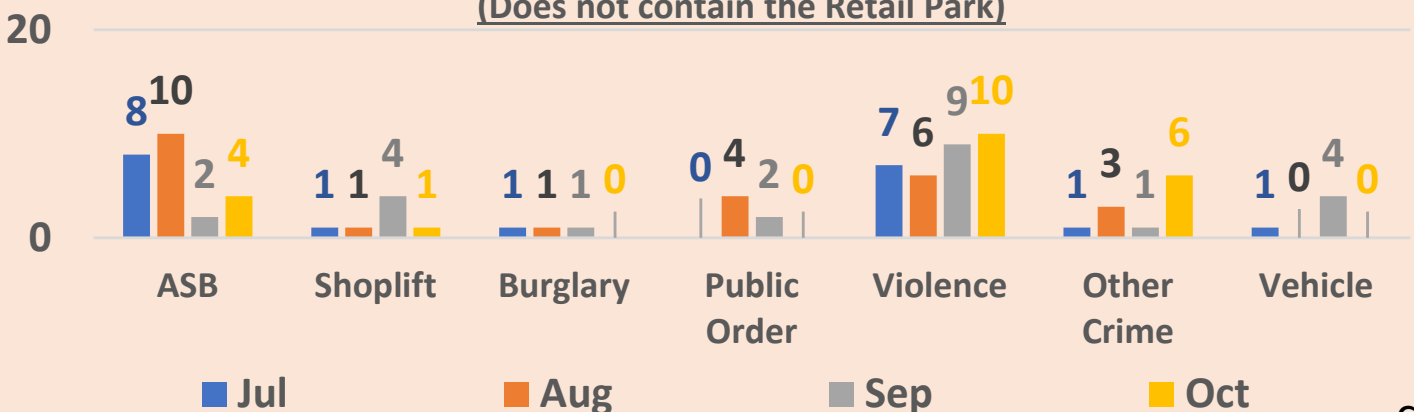

2020 Pinewood Crime Overview

Crime levels over the past year have been steady with Pinewood recording around 25 crimes a month.

Over the last year violence and antisocial behaviour have been the largest contributors to the list.

Pinewood suffered back in 2019 with lots of vehicle crimes where people were having items stolen from their cars overnight. It still happens but not as much this year, all we can ask is that you try and remember to lock your car when you leave it outside your house.

Pinewood is a lovely area in general, these few people who carry out such crimes do not live in our area and are mostly opportunist thieves trying door hands etc, just looking for that unlocked car.

There are many camera systems or one off cameras on the market now, many have come down in price, these together with some sensor lighting can make all the difference to put such thieves off.

Working from home has become the new normal for some, if you do, please remain vigilant and never be afraid to phone 101 or report anything online with the Suffolk police reporting tool, <https://www.suffolk.police.uk/contact-us/report-something>

The boy racers have caused great annoyance for not just people living near Tesco's Copdock but surrounding roads and roads through Pinewood too. Again if you have any annoyance issues of antisocial behaviour you can use the police reporting tool.

At this time of year, please keep presents etc hidden where possible and keep the doors locked even when you are at home, these opportunist thieves only need an unlocked door!.
