Speeding in Pinewood

As a result of speeding incidents last year, especially those that have taken place on Belmont Road, the Parish council has been in regular contact with Suffolk Police regarding these matters and a number of speed checks have already been carried out.

You will have noticed that we use a (Speed Indicator Device) SID device which warns drivers if they are exceeding the speed limit and that it is regularly moved around the parish in an effort to deter drivers from speeding. As a result of its use we have built up a comprehensive record of excess speeding in the parish. However, it has become apparent that more stringent measures are needed. We are in discussion with our partners about extending the SID to include a capacity for an ANPR (Automatic Number Plate Recognition) system. If we are able to obtain it, this should have a significant effect on the behaviour of drivers. Our County Councillor Chris Hudson has also been involved in this.

We have written to Tim Passmore, Police and Crime Commissioner, asking for the traffic slowing surface on the bend to be replaced as it has worn out, and also for much clearer warning signage Traffic calming measures cannot be installed immediately they are asked for. A process has to be followed and evidence produced to prove that the measures are necessary and suitable for the site in question.

At the Parish Council Meeting on 13th September, this matter was again discussed with comprehensive data regarding speeding being produced. Since then, a further meeting with the Police was held on 23rd September.

Speed checks carried out in Pinewood by Suffolk Constabulary since

2019

October 2019 - Grove Hill to Belstead Village

14125 vehicles over 7 days, 6406 over speed limit (19% of vehicles)

November 2019 - Shepherds Drive from Hawthorn Drive to Scrivener Drive

107616 vehicles over 7 days, 9442 vehicles over speed limit (2% of vehicles)

June 2020 - Belmont Road from Hawthorn Drive to Ellenbrook Road

41814 vehicles over 7 days, sited on hill with 9442 over speed limit (8% of vehicles)

April 2021 - Belmont Road speed check

The Speed Enforcement Team - 28th April and have reported 18 vehicles for speeding.

Speeding Complaints from Pinewood Residents

There have been many complaints regarding speeding in the Pinewood area and it could be time to implement a Volunteer Community Speed Watch Team. The Community Speed Watch initiative allows members of the community to address the issue of speeding by becoming actively involved in road safety and monitoring speeds at safe locations within and around Pinewood with speed detection equipment. It is an attempt to address the problem of speeding through the joint work of the Police, local Residents and Parish Councils.

The aim is NOT to catch as many speeding drivers as possible but to reduce speed in areas of concern.

Community Speed Watch (CSW) informs drivers that excessive speed is socially unacceptable and helps to re-educate drivers about the dangers of speeding whilst addressing concerns from local residents about vehicles speeding through their neighbourhoods.

How it works:

- •There must be a minimum of 6 volunteers who must be over 18 years old.
- •Each scheme must have a Co-ordinator and a Deputy, the Parish Council will support the scheme, locations selected will be assessed by the Constabulary.
- •You will have to sign a CSW agreement and be vetted.
- •Equipment will be provided by the Constabulary with training provided on using the equipment along with Health and Safety issues.
- •Volunteers will be covered by the Constabulary's insurance.




You may have seen the Speed Activated Device (SID) placed around Pinewood which gives information to motorists of the speed their vehicle is travelling. The SID records speed of vehicles but does not record vehicle details. The SID device is a training device to notify drivers of speed, which shows a "Thank You" in green for those complying with the limits and a "Slow Down" in red for those driving over the limits. It is maintained by the Parish Council and is placed in identified areas where speeds are known to be excessive and reported as dangerous.

Pinewood Parish "Planning" Information

Interchange 55 Planning Application DC/21/05110

An application has been submitted to Babergh District Council to develop a piece of land which borders the A14, Thompson and Morgan and the Copdock Park and Ride site, into a light industrial site. The plans indicate that the majority of the space will be for warehousing, storage or distribution so it is likely that most vehicular movements will be for HGV's and other large vehicles. The site is likely to be operating 24/7.

Access to the site will be from the A1214 Tesco roundabout, past the back of Tesco past the filling station, then via a newly designed and constructed roundabout at the entrance to the Park and Ride site. Traffic will exit via the same roundabout from the Park and Ride but will then access the main road network via the Scrivener Drive/Tesco roundabout.

The potential implications for residents of Pinewood in terms of noise and extra traffic on our already congested local road network are significant. Pinewood Parish Council has therefore submitted an objection to this development voicing concerns on traffic and environmental grounds.

Any noise nuisance will affect those closest to the site but the effect on the local road network, particularly the Scrivener Drive roundabout could affect the ability of all residents to access the wider road network.

We consider it not acceptable that a Traffic Assessment based on 2018 data is relevant. We agree with Suffolk Highways, that a TA that it should be amended to reflect traffic data from 2021 with a projection for a future assessment of 5 years. The 2018 TA does not include sites already within the new Babergh Joint Local Plan and Suffolk Highways are already not satisfied with the TA produced for the Wolsey Grange development. Pinewood PC that therefore asked that an up-to-date TA is carried out to reflect current road use and projected use from already planned housing developments.

Thompson and Morgan see the development of the site as an opportunity for expansion and the ability to divert lorries operating on a 24/7 basis through the site to the wider road network. Both they and Taylor Wimpey see this as a benefit to residents living on Poplar Lane. Extra traffic using the Scrivener Drive/ Tesco roundabout en route to the Copdock Interchange will certainly be of no benefit to residents of Pinewood.

Our contention is that by using the proposed access and exit routes, that this site is not suitable for the purpose proposed in the application.

A POTENTIAL LIFE SAVER ARRIVES AT PINEWOOD COMMUNITY HALL

Pinewood Parish Council has purchased and installed an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) and the site is now registered as containing a Community Public Accessible Defibrillator (CPAD). The AED is enclosed within a secured wall mounted cabinet on the external wall of the community hall close to the car park entrance to the hall.

To prevent theft and vandalism to the AED it is positioned in a prominent location which is well illuminated and the door to the cabinet is protected by a key coded opening system.

The position of the AED will allow twenty four hour access to it, giving fast and easy accessibility to not only the users of the hall, but also to the emergency services and members of the general public whenever it is required.

Why the need for a CPAD

Sudden cardiac arrest claims around 150,000 to 200,000 lives each year in the UK, with survival rates being around 5% to 10% outside of a hospital setting. If a person's heart has stopped due to an accident or heart attack and is in a rhythm called ventricular fibrillation, the only way to get the heart into a more regular sustaining beat is to pass an electrical charge through the heart muscle. The first three to four minutes are the most vital for the collapsed person and if Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and a AED are available, then the chances of survival will increase considerably.

How does a CPAD site work

In the event of a person collapsing someone needs to dial 999 to call for an ambulance giving details of a suspected heart condition. The Ambulance service will direct the caller to where the nearest CPAD site is and will also give the caller the key code to enable them to open the cabinet. Each CPAD site covers an area of one mile radius to allow for fast retrieval of the AED and return to the casualty.

Do you need training in the use of a AED

The UK resuscitation council guidelines state there is no requirement to be trained in the use of an AED and that in the event of a person collapsing the non-trained person should still use the AED as step-by-step voice prompts that are part of the AED, talks the user through the process of what to do.

Is there any risks in using an AED

If someone is having a cardiac arrest, using an AED, and undertaking CPR will improve the chances of survival. There have never been any reports of an AED harming a patient, user, or bystander. In addition, there have been no reports of an AED delivering any inappropriate shocks.

What is CPR?

CPR stands for cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

If someone is unconscious and not breathing normally, call 999 and start CPR straight away.

When you call for an ambulance, telephone systems now exist that can give basic life-saving instructions, including advice about CPR.

CPR on adults

If you have been trained in CPR, including rescue breaths, and feel confident using your skills, you should give chest compressions with rescue breaths.

If you're not completely confident, attempt hands-only CPR instead.

Hands-only CPR

To carry out a chest compression

Place the heel of your hand on the breastbone at the centre of the person's chest.

Place your other hand on top of your other hand and interlock your fingers.

Position yourself with your shoulders above your hands.

Using your body weight (not just your arms), press straight down by 5 to 6cm (2 to 2.5 inches) on their chest.

Keeping your hands on their chest, release the compression and allow the chest to return to its original position.

Repeat these compressions at a rate of 100 to 120 times a minute until an ambulance arrives or you become exhausted.

Putting someone in the recovery position follow these steps

With the person lying on their back, kneel on the floor at their side.

Extend the arm nearest you at a right angle to their body with their palm facing up.

Take their other arm and fold it so the back of their hand rests on the cheek closest to you and hold it in place.

Use your free hand to bend the person's knee farthest from you to a right angle. Carefully roll the person onto their side by pulling on the bent knee.

Their bent arm should be supporting the head, and their extended arm will stop you rolling them too far.

Make sure their bent leg is at a right angle.

Open their airway by gently tilting their head back and lifting their chin, and check that nothing is blocking their airway.

Stay with the person and monitor their condition until help arrives.



Winter Security

To prevent the seasonal increase in burglaries and theft from motor vehicles, the force is encouraging householders and motorists to follow some simple crime prevention advice to keep their property safe.

Follow the 'lights, locks and leave' process

Residents should avoid leaving their homes unlit in the evenings for example, as a house in darkness is more likely to attract the attentions of burglars.

Vehicles should also ideally be parked in a well-lit and secure place. Making sure your doors and windows are locked can be a deterrent for an intruder. Many burglaries are opportunistic crimes, where the offender has identified an open window or insecure door and easily let themselves into your home. Residents are advised to perform the following four simple checks: check vehicles, shut windows, lock doors and check outbuildings.

Further to this, Suffolk police is reminding the public to take care in what they share on social media. Virtual indicators can be just as dangerous as physical ones.

Those that live in an area previously targeted by thieves or those who are planning to increase their home security could also consider installing smart technology such as a doorbell camera.

People are also asked to consider, where possible, the fitting of good quality locks/alarms – the <u>www.securedbydesign.com</u> website is police accredited and contains lots of useful advice.

We encourage people to photograph valuable items and to register via the www.securedbydesign.com this is a national property register and this then enables police to identify recovered property if stolen and return to rightful owners, and it is free to use.

If you notice any suspicious activity or believe a crime to be in progress you are urged to call the police immediately on 999. If you feel that you have information about crimes being committed, you can call Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

Dog mess is the most unacceptable and offensive type of litter on our streets. Research tells us that dog fouling is the issue the public are most concerned about.

Dog fouling is not only deeply unpleasant, it is dangerous. Whilst rare, contact with dog excrement can cause toxocariasis – a nasty infection that can lead to dizziness, nausea, asthma and even blindness or seizures.

It's no wonder dog fouling is such a problem – there are estimated to be more than 8 million dogs producing more than 1,000 tonnes of mess every day in the UK alone.

While most dog owners are caring, responsible individuals, there are still some people who do not clean up after their pets.

Anyone who fails to clear up after their dog can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice of up to £100. If the case goes to court this could cost the owner or person in charge of the animal up to £1,000.

The law states that being unaware a dog has fouled or not having a suitable bag is not a reasonable excuse.

Taking a rapid lateral flow test at home

If you did a rapid lateral flow test at home and the result was positive, you and anyone you live with must self-isolate immediately. Find out how long to self-isolate for: www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/self-isolatenand-treatment/how-long-to-self-isolate/ and report your rapid lateral flow test result as soon as possible to: www.gov.uk/report-covid19-result. You should get a PCR test ordered at www.gov.uk/get-coronavirus-test (a test that is sent to a lab) to confirm your result as soon as possible.


Continue to self-isolate until you get the result of the PCR test. Follow the advice you're given when you get the result. A negative result means that active coronavirus infection was not detected, at the time of the test. However, this does not guarantee that you do not have coronavirus. You should continue to follow coronavirus rules, including regular hand washing, social distancing and using face coverings where required.
